Missing Middle Housing Campaign By Erica Sladky

Are you concerned with housing stock availability and affordability in Omaha? If so, please consider joining the Omaha Missing Middle Housing Campaign!

Missing middle housing refers to a range of multi-unit or clustered housing types including townhomes, granny flats, and garden apartments that blend seamlessly into Omaha neighborhoods dominated by single family detached homes.

Omaha's zoning code has not received a significant revision since 1987 and currently presents considerable barriers for missing middle. This campaign is supporting the City in efforts to simplify zoning regulations allowing for missing middle housing within "infill" residential neighborhoods, east of I-680.


Partnership 4 Kids is Omaha's only in-school, curriculum-based, career-bound mentoring program. We are in 16 Omaha Public Schools; in your neighborhood we are in Field Club Elementary and then by association likely Norris and Marrs Middle and South High.

At Field Club we work with all students. Our Book Buddies read to pre-k through third graders, working on gradually increasing steps of literacy. Our Goal Buddies work with 4-5/6th graders on goal setting and achieving with literacy, attendance, and life skills. In these grades we also introduce future-thinking and careers.

Formal Group Mentoring begins in middle school and continues through 10th grade. Here true career exploration begins in and amongst curriculum of financial vitality, community responsibility and more. Junior year turns from group mentoring to one-on-one case management. Here is where our students create the plan to obtain the career of their dreams and we help them achieve it.

We are always looking for good volunteer mentors. Book Buddies, Goal Buddies, and Group Mentors are an essential part of the success of our program. We'd love to have you volunteer with us in your neighborhood schools. The rewards are many.

Yard Waste, Then and Now.....

The LNA has been proud to be an active participant in Omaha's clean-up effort for decades. In the start-up years, I presented an idea to the Parks Department to mulch trees and bushes instead of trying to pack them into an open dumpster. Initially we were told it would cost overtime at various park sites to operate the city-owned chippers. I showed the savings of almost \$50,000 per year to NOT throw away this material. One of our plaques on the wall at HQ reflects a partnership award for this idea. Interestingly today certain pubic officials want to continue to throwing these items in the dump.

A statewide landfill ban on yard waste went into effect in 1994. The exception to this ban is that the landfill has been approved to take yard waste year round to aid in methane production for a beneficial use. Mayor Stothert has applied this exemption as the reason NOT to collect and compost this commodity.

In the very near future Omaha will decide if the trash hauling contract will allow three separate containers for recycling, yard waste and trash vs. just two, one for trash (to include yard waste) and one for recycling. Either way will be an improvement to our current green bin system.

I am an advocate for composting. With the large quantity of mature trees, bushes, etc. in a neighborhood such as ours, it only makes sense to keep resulting debris from going into a hole in the ground. Note that I have never collecting grass clippings and bagged them. These you should leave on the lawn for natural composting.

If you agree that Omaha should compost yard waste, NOW is the time to let your city councilperson and the Mayor know.

Leavenworth Neighborhood Association In Case You Missed It from June 20, 2019 General Meeting

In Attendance: 18

Treasurer – Account Balances: Checking Account: \$6,777.23, which includes money transferred from the PayPal account, and Jim Krin Fund: \$668.84.

Old Business:

- <u>Park Avenue Project:</u> Complete the 4-question survey by 6/30. RDG will present survey results at a community meeting the end of July.
- Concerns about the inCommon property at 1029
 Park Ave is in poor condition and doesn't appear to be cared for. Suggested that code violations be reported to city.
- Omaha Gives: LNA received 13 donations totaling \$250.
- MNA Grant: The grant proposal for an LNA compost bin was approved, and we are awaiting the check. A site for the bin must be determined.
- LNA's grant proposal for a paper and electronic shred event was approved. The board will determine which company to go with and secure a date.

New Business:

- Leavenworth Park: Ashley's conversation with the city resulted in the city placing extra soccer goals and additional trash cans at the park. Suggestion to write a grant proposal to SONA to fix up the baseball field such as "dragging"/leveling the field among other things. Suggestion for more "No Littering" signs in the park.
- SONA Grant: Members approved proceeding with a grant proposal to SONA for a marketing campaign to increase LNA membership, including a mass mailing/every door direct mailer, or door hangers, and printing more marketing material. The cost is around \$700 for a 2,300-piece mailing. Suggestion to print in both English and Spanish.
- <u>TAGG:</u> Members encouraged to use the TAGG app to donate a portion of their purchase at participating sites to a specified non-profit (LNA). To date, LNA has received \$250.
- Please bring any new grant options and project ideas to the board.
- <u>LNA Website</u>: Email pictures to Ashley, and she will put them onto the website. Suggested that there be a bigger archive of LNA newsletters on the website.



- <u>Dewey Park:</u> Lights are still needed for the basketball and handball courts. Hopefully lights will be added when the dog park is constructed.
- <u>Board Election:</u> Ben White resigned from the board as he is opening his own law firm outside of the LNA neighborhood. Addie Gengenbach nominated herself, and was voted in by acclamation.
- Weed pulling on Saturday, 6/22 starting at 9:00 am at the Harney St. garden.
- Erica shared about Omaha's Missing Middle Housing Campaign - a county-wide campaign that promotes more house-scale buildings with multiple units in walkable neighborhoods. Omaha needs more middle housing, and the campaign works to change zoning in areas so more middle housing can be built.
- LNA Picnic/National Night Out: The LNA Picnic will be combined with National Night Out, and be held on Tuesday, August 6th at Dewey Park. LNA will provide the meat, drinks, paper products, and members are asked to bring a side dish or dessert.
